Blaine City Council approval spans stages of life-cycle housing

Blaine City Council's action items at last week's meeting encompassed life stages from infants to young families to senior citizens.

But perhaps the most unique was the long awaited and much needed housing for senior citizens that will allow empty nesters and aging baby boomers looking to downsize the opportunity to stay in Blaine.

The council granted final plat approval to Rottlund Homes for Club West 14th Addition and a conditional use permit to build 120 senior condominium units (residents must be 55 years of age or more) in a development flex zoning district.

The development, at Club West Parkway and 111th Avenue N.E., is an addition to the existing Club West development approved by the council in 2001.

"We think it will finish off the Club West project very nicely," Schafer said.

The 120 units will be divided into two, three-story buildings with 60 units in each building. Rottlund is offering 11 floor plans, including one and two bedrooms and one- and two-bathroom condos with floor plans ranging from 841 to 1,548 square feet.

'Report Card'
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Extending helping hands, water, supplies to Katrina's victims

With faucets going full blast, Blaine's own Eniva Corporation is helping to relieve the devastation suffered by the hardest hit victims of Hurricane Katrina.

The company, a manufacturer and distributor of dietary supplements and nutrition

products, is donating 100,000 bottles of purified drinking water and as many non-perishable food items, articles of clothing and personal care items they can gather in the next 30 days.

"We all just think it's really great that we can do something to help out," said Eniva's Kathy Burland, adding that the

company will be donating time on its bottling line to fulfill the commitment. Employees and distributors will be donating time during the evenings and weekends to help bottle, label and package cases of water.

Eniva has also converted its two will-call warehouses to serve as long-term drop-off locations for the public to donate

non-perishables, clothing and personal care items.

Donated items will be collected Monday through Friday, 8 a.m.-5 p.m. at 9702 Ulysses St., Blaine; and Monday, Wednesday and Friday, 8 a.m. - 5 p.m. and Tuesday and Thursday, 8 a.m.-9 p.m. at 8744 35W Service Drive, Blaine.

Burland estimates the monetary value of the donated water at \$200,000, and said the 100,000 bottles will fill 10 semi-trailer trucks.

Eniva's national base of distributors will also be making monetary donations to help with the water relief effort. For every \$1 donated, Eniva will send out three bottles of water.

The Blaine company records in its history many other relief efforts, including a donation of more than \$30,000 in nutritional products to the victims of the tsunami disaster and a regular donation of water and supplements to the Mayo Foundation's Camp Jornada.

Products are sent worldwide to U.S. soldiers and military personnel, and Eniva provides free supplements to churches, schools, sports groups and amateur athletes.
